**La Reine des Bois, Domaine de la Mordorée** 2009 £64.99

**Côte-Rôtie, Pierre Gaillard** 2016 £59.99

*Pierre Gaillard is considered to be one of France's top wine producers in the Northern Rhone, whose business is centred in the medieval town of Malleval. His Côte-Rôtie – blend of Syrah & a touch of Viognier - has terrific complexity in its red and black fruits, cured meats, spice and earthy, leathery aromas and flavours. Nicely concentrated, medium to full-bodied and is wonderfully balanced.*

**Côte-Rôtie 'Madinière', Yves Cuilleron** 2007 £59.99

*Yves Cuilleron is an important name in the northern Rhône. His family farmed there since at least the early 1900s, and as a 4th generation winemaker, he has since taken on holdings in St.-Joseph, Condrieu and the Côte-Rôtie. While on one hand, he farms as naturally as possible, in the vineyard he has been open to experimenting with new oak. His fearlessness in trying new things in pursuit of producing world-class wines is admirable, and it is definitely working!*

**Cornas 'Vin Noir', Domaine du Tunnel** 2007 £59.99

*Stéphane Robert continues to fashion beautifully rich, full-bodied, classic wines reflective of their terroirs. He is regarded as a rising star in Cornas amongst Rhône producers and wine critics alike. Domaine du Tunnel is named after its quirky cellar, which lies in a 170m long converted railway tunnel which was once used by steam trains and is now home to this increasingly important Cornas domaine.*

**Les Grenache de Sixte Vieilles Vignes Domaine Giraud** 2011 £22.99

*Domaine Giraud is one of the up-and-coming superstars of the appellation. Run by a dynamic young couple, this is a special cuvee made for importer Eric Solomon that comes from Lirac, where Sixte is one of the appellation's most famous parcels.*

**Cotes du Rhone Coudoulet de Beaucastel, Famille Perrin** 2012 £32.99

*An outstanding example of this cuvee. Showing plenty of black cherry, mineral, cracked pepper and underbrush, it is medium-bodied, possesses great acidity, and gains in both richness and depth in the glass.*

**Cotes du Rhone Coudoulet de Beaucastel, Famille Perrin** 2015 £32.99

*Perennially one of the best Côtes du Rhône on the market, the Perrins have hit the mark again with their 2015 Cotes du Rhone Coudoulet de Beaucastel. So complex and rich, it can compete with many producers' Châteauneufs, this vintage reveals dark fruit, hints of cola, cinnamon and allspice and a long, slightly warm finish.*

**Cornas, 'Empreintes' Eric et Joel Durand** 2011 £39.99

*This small estate is run by brothers Eric and Joel Durand who started working with their father in 1988. The style here is quasi-modern, with plenty of destemming and moderate new oak, but the wines all hold onto plenty of Cornas character. They have excelled with their 2011 offering that is nicely within its prime drinking window.*

**Châteauneuf-du-Pape, L'Accent de la Roquette, Domaine de la Roquette** 2007 £84.99

**Châteauneuf-du-Pape, 'Cuvée Reserve', Roger Sabon** 2009 £39.99

<b>Châteauneuf-du-Pape, Domaine des Saumades</b>	2015	£35.99

*The fifth generation of a local winemaking family Frank and Muriel Mousset created the tiny (2.5 hectares) Domaine in 1995. Such a limited production allows the Moussets to focus on growing the very highest quality fruit. They are certainly in the modernist camp as their wines are powerful and fruit driven and develop into graceful, elegant Chateaufneuf's with age.*

**Châteauneuf-du-Pape 'Cuvée Prestige' Roger Sabon** 2009 £39.99

*A blockbuster Chateaufneuf-du-Pape that is produced from parcels that average 90 years of age or older. This is opulent, multi-layered, silky and has a finish that goes on and on and on!*

<b>Châteauneuf-du-Pape, La Reine des Bois, Domaine de la Mordorée</b>	<b>2007</b>	<b>£80.99</b>
<i>Christophe and Fabrice Delorme at Domaine de la Mordorée did not take long to project this fine estate (which is named, somewhat poetically, after a woodcock) into the Premier League. The cuvée 'Reine des Bois' is a limited bottling only produced in the very finest years.</i>		
<b>Châteauneuf-du-Pape, L'Accent de Roquette, Domaine la Roquette</b>	<b>2010</b>	<b>£59.99</b>
<i>The two Lieu Dits of Pialons and Pignan provide fruit for this spectacular and showy 'L'Accent de Roquette'. The domaine is owned by Daniel and Frédéric Brunier of Vieux Télégraphe as a separate and stylistically very different production. The beautiful purity and elegance and extremely pretty fruit profile makes a wonderful counterpoint to their earthy and masculine Vieux Télégraphe.</i>		
<b>Châteauneuf-du-Pape, 'Cuvée Mourre des Perdrix' Domaine de la Charbonniere</b>	<b>2009</b>	<b>£54.99</b>
<i>A sexy, full-bodied, sweetly fruited southern Rhone that offers textbook notes of kirsch, black cherries, incense and dried flowers. It shows the upfront, perfumed style of the vintage, yet has a beautiful elegance, as well as impressive length - a brilliant vintage!</i>		
<b>Châteauneuf-du-Pape Les Sinarde Familie Perrin</b>	<b>2007</b>	<b>£44.99</b>
<i>Chateau Beaucastel, a benchmark estate that excels at all price points, has been run by several generations of the Perrin family. Now in the care of Brothers Jean-Pierre and Francois Perrin as well as their four sons, they have quickly become the dominate wine producers of the entire southern Rhone Valley. This excellent vintage possesses terrific concentration and richness.</i>		
<b>Crozes-Hermitage, 'Domaine de Thalabert', Domaine Paul Jaboulet Aîné</b>	<b>2009</b>	<b>£42.99</b>
<i>Paul Jaboulet Aîné are amongst the Rhône Valley's most iconic producers and this is one of the most exciting wines in their stable. Although much of its 40 hectares have been replanted at Thalabert since the war, a high proportion of old vines remain. Indeed, it may well be the largest planting of old Syrah vines in the world.</i>		
<b>Hermitage, Domaine M. Sorrel</b>	<b>2011</b>	<b>£69.99</b>
<i>A very small producer, even by Rhone standards, Marc Sorrel is one of the recognised heavyweights of the Hermitage appellation with his vineyards in the best locations in the area. His 2011 Hermitage is silky and delicate with supreme poise and balance.</i>		
<b>Le Paradis Saint Pierre, Pierre et Jerome Coursodon, St-Joseph</b>	<b>2006</b>	<b>£35.99</b>
<i>Jérôme Coursodon is a true Saint-Joseph specialist. Since 1998 he has brought fresh blood and a new vision in the process of making delicate and fine Northern Rhône wines. This, his top wine is made only in the finest vintages and fashioned from the estates oldest vines (80 years).</i>		
<b>Lirac 'Vin de Mr le Baron' Château de Montfaucon</b>	<b>2005</b>	<b>£39.99</b>
<i>Located opposite to Châteauneuf-du-Pape, Château de Montfaucon spreads over 45 hectares of vineyards. Today, owner Rudolphe de Pins, who made wine at Domaine du Vieux Telegraphe, follows sustainable practices and farms at low yields to create concentrated wines packed full of character.</i>		

## **BORDEAUX WHITE**

<b>Château Lamothe-Bouscaut, Pessac-Léognan</b>	<b>2019</b>	<b>£26.99</b>
<i>Cadaujac is one of the closest villages of the Pessac-Léognan appellation to Bordeaux. It is here that the Château of Lamothe-Bouscaut stands proud, along the national road that links Bordeaux to Toulouse. 12 Hectares of a single continuous vineyard surround the Château, a former fortress dating back to the 12th century. This Sauvignon Blanc, Semillon is wonderfully well-rounded, with grapefruit and pineapple flavours. The oak (aged for 8 months) is subtle and well-integrated, giving the wine excellent body and balance.</i>		
<b>Clos des Lunes "Lune d'Or" Grand Vin</b>	<b>2018</b>	<b>3 Bottles in Presentation Box £150.00</b>
<i>Located in Sauternes, on one of the greatest white wine terroirs in France, the Clos des Lunes is a magnificent rolling vineyard planted with old Sémillon and Sauvignon Blanc vines. For the very rare 'Lune d'Or' everything comes down to a meticulous selection of the best fruit from very old vines that produces a tiny quantity of just 20 barrels each year. This wine sits alongside the world's greatest. It offers remarkable purity, great expressiveness, a very rich structure and a soulfulness that reveals itself as time passes.</i>

<b>Château Clos Saint Martin 'Grand Cru Classé', Saint-Émilion</b>	<b>2012</b>	<b>£58.49</b>
<i>"This is a beautiful wine from this micro-estate (three acres) near the cemetery in St.-Emilion. Dense ruby/purple in color, it has pure, rich, black raspberry and black cherry fruit, a hint of minerality and stunning purity, texture and length. This is nearly impossible to find in the marketplace, but what a wonderful treasure for those lucky enough to find any." 93 Points RobertParker.com</i>		
<b>Château Beauséjour 'Duffau Lagarrosse', 'Grand Cru Classé', Saint-Émilion</b>	<b>2012</b>	<b>£84.99</b>
<i>"A massive, concentrated effort from this great terroir, the 2012 Beausejour Duffau comes from a 16+-acre vineyard located on the clay and limestone southern slopes of St.-Emilion. It was cropped at 23 hectoliters per hectare, and the final blend was 75% Merlot and 25% Cabernet Franc. Only 66% of the production went into this top wine, which boasts 14.3% natural alcohol. You can count on this cuvee being one of the finest wines of the vintage given the talented team behind it." 95+ Points RobertParker.com</i>		
<b>Château de Fonbel (Vauthier), Saint-Émilion</b>	<b>2012</b>	<b>£39.99</b>
<i>great value St-Emilion made by one of the region's top winemakers. The 16 ha estate is owned by Alain Vauthier, owner of the famous first growth of Château Ausone, and it is his daughter Pauline along with Ausone's winemaking team who craft the wines here. Around 8000 cases are made each year and while it doesn't soar to the lofty quality heights of its big brother, Château de Fonbel offers a seductively beautiful left bank red. The vineyards lie on gently sloping sandy soils and have the highest planting of Carmenère which contributes to Fonbel's unique style. Whilst there are no facilities at the estate, vinification is carried out at nearby Moulin St Georges. This is an elegant St.-Emilion offering up scents of lead pencil shavings intermixed with blueberries, black currants, and boysenberries, and plenty of minerality. The finish shows excellent depth, ripeness, freshness, and vibrancy as well as velvety tannins.</i>		
<b>Château Fleur Cardinale 'Grand Cru Classé' Saint-Émilion</b>	<b>2010</b>	<b>£108.00</b>
<i>Aged for 16 months in new oak. Dominique Decoster, previously the owner of Porcelaines Haviland in Limoges, has worked here full time along with his wife Florence since Spring 2001. Made with the assistance of notable winemaking consultants Jean-Philippe Fort, from Michel Rolland's laboratory, and St.-Émilion's bad boy, Jean-Luc Thunevin. "Another over-achieving, brilliant effort from the Decosters, the 2010 from their 45-acre vineyard is a blend of 70% Merlot and the rest equal parts Cabernet Franc &amp; Cabernet Sauvignon."</i>		
<b>Château Valandraud 'Premier Grand Cru Classe', Saint-Émilion</b>	<b>2015</b>	<b>£157.50</b>
<i>2015 is one of the best harvests Valandraud has ever produced. That says something, given the many special harvests made on the property over the years. This small Saint-Emilion property, planted mainly to Merlot, is highly sought after and has developed a cult reputation in Bordeaux. One of the original 'garage wines', as its cash-strapped owners made the first vintage in 1991 in a rented garage, Valandraud has always strived to do things its own way. Their sometimes-controversial approach has not always won them fans amongst Bordeaux's wine bureaucracy, but their wines have done the talking and this tiny chateau is consistently released to wide critical acclaim.</i>		
<b>Château Pontet-Canet, Pauillac</b>	<b>2005</b>	<b>£143.99</b>
<i>A large Pauillac Estate that can trace its origins back to 1725, when Jean-François Pontet gave his name to the estate he had acquired. The wine was not château-bottled until 1972 and in 1975 the property was sold to Guy Tesseron, of the Tesseron family, one of the finest exponents of luxury, very old, aged Cognacs. The Tesseron also own Château Lafon-Rochet in St-Estephe. Its 78 ha adjoin those of Mouton Rothschild and the owners have vastly improved the quality of the wines which are now full-bodied and packed with ripe, chewy, black fruits and finely integrated tannins. In addition the wines possess marvellous ageing potential. For the 2005 the owner has produced an utterly extraordinary wine; without question the best Pontet-Canet ever: with incredible silky tannins, and perfect balance, this has everything you could ever want from a wine. Creamy blackberries, and an incredibly precise shape, lead to a spellbinding finish that makes your tongue tingle. Tasting this wine is one of those experiences where you wonder how a few grapes can be transformed into such an elixir - a sensational effort that rivals the first growths. Unmissable - truly magical and certainly a "must try before you die!"</i>		
<b>Château Haut-Bages Liberal, Pauillac</b>	<b>2008</b>	<b>£44.99</b>
<i>Though it has a long history, Haut-Bages Libéral has come into its own since 2000, when Claire came on board after the tragic death of her parents. Under her leadership, the property is making perhaps its best-ever wines. In the cellar, Claire works with some striking diamond-shaped amphorae, made from Limoges porcelain. Brimming full of classic Pauillac, the wine has notes of cedar wood and a sweet core of damson and cassis fruit.</i>		
<b>La Reserve de La Comtesse, Pauillac</b>	<b>2009</b>	<b>£53.99</b>
<i>The second growth of Château Pichon Longueville Comtesse de Lalande, the Réserve de la Comtesse, was created and sold for the first time in 1973. Second growths represent between 20 percent and 50 percent of the total production of the Château. From the same soil, the second growth benefits from the technology and reputation of the great wine. There's been a lot of talk about the 2009 Chateau Pichon-Lalande being a contender for wine of this vintage, but its second wine was also a real treat in the same year. The Réserve de la Comtesse really has a lot of the grace and flair of the Grand Vin and as such can be considered the finest second wine they have made, the 2009 Reserve de Comtesse is composed of 53% Cabernet Sauvignon, 38% Merlot, and the rest Cabernet Franc. Flavourful and full-bodied with loads of texture and opulence, it offers up aromas of forest floor and black fruits. The surprisingly high tannin level is barely noticeable given the sweetness of the fruit and abundant glycerin.</i>		
<b>Château du Tertre, Margaux</b>	<b>2012</b>	<b>£44.99</b>

<b>Château Angludet, Margaux</b>	<b>2011</b>	<b>£44.99</b>
<i>Under the ownership of well-known Bordeaux negociants the Sichel family since 1961, Angludet translates to 'Angel of the High Land'. Surrounded as it is by all Grand Cru Classé properties, Château Angludet would almost certainly have been included in the 1855 Classification, had the property not been broken up as part of an inheritance settlement. In an act of faith (given the property's state of decay) and belief in Angludet's potential, the Sichel family bought the estate in 1961. Since then, the Sichels have worked tirelessly to restore and improve the vineyard and cellars, giving Angludet back the reputation its exceptional terroir deserves. The wines now enjoy a worldwide reputation for their elegance, aromatic finesse and their exceptional ageing potential. The 2011 is delicious, ripe and rich with a wonderful pure, bright and crunchy core of red berries that really leaves you wanting more - a wine that you could easily fall in love with.</i>		
<b>Château Angludet, Margaux</b>	<b>2012</b>	<b>£44.99</b>
<i>Another truly exceptional wine from the Sichel family, the 2012 dAngludet has a deep ruby/purple color, a sweet floral, blueberry and blackcurrant-scented nose with a touch of licorice, light tannins, low acidity and a nice, fleshy mouthfeel. This is a sexy, mouth-filling and satisfying wine from both a hedonistic and intellectual vantage point.</i>		
<b>Château Haut-Bergey, Pessac-Léognan</b>	<b>2010</b>	<b>£40.49</b>
<i>Pessac-Léognan is a sub-region of Graves, the famous area just south of the town of Bordeaux itself. Dating back to the 14th century, Haut Bergey was an under-achiever until bought by Sylviane Garcin-Cathiard in 1991. Her daughter Helene now runs the estate with husband Patrice Leveque, along with Clos L'Eglise (Pomerol, just 6 hectares), Branon (Pessac-Léognan), Barde-Haut (Saint Emilion Grand Cru), and, last but not least, Poesia, in Mendoza, Argentina. The estate has been extensively renovated and the construction of three new chais were carried out to rehabilitate the domain. The 29 ha of Haut Bergey are not all in production, 21 ha are planted with 65% Cabernet Sauvignon and 35% Merlot while 3 ha are planted with 65% Sauvignon Blanc and 35% Semillon. The 2010 exhibits blackberry, gravel, coffee, liquorice, smoke and earthy aromatics in abundance. With easy to like textures, this medium bodied Pessac Leognan ends with a spicy, black cherry finish.</i>		
<b>Château Larrivet, Haut-Brion, Pessac-Léognan</b>	<b>2014</b>	<b>£35.99</b>
<i>Château Larrivet Haut-Brion is located a mere 15km south-east of Bordeaux and has been consistently impressive since its excellent 1996. General manager, Philippe Gervoson, has enlisted the help of the legendary oenologist Michel Rolland who has implemented radical changes such as hand-picking the grapes as late as possible to ensure maximum ripeness. Rolland's great skill is to help make wines that are true representations of their commune, and these are fine examples.</i>		
<b>La Parde de Haut-Bailly, Pessac-Léognan</b>	<b>2009</b>	<b>£49.49</b>
<b>La Parde de Haut-Bailly, Pessac-Léognan</b>	<b>2010</b>	<b>£49.49</b>
<i>Château Haut-Bailly is a Graves Cru Classé estate that has really hit form in the last 18 years. Haut-Bailly was bought by the Sanders family in 1955 and was run by Jean Sanders until 1998 when Robert G. Wilmers, an American banker, purchased it. It is located in the commune of Léognan, which is usually more associated with white wine production. This second wine of the Estate is attractive, soft and round with notes of berry fruit and some underlying smoke, forest floor and underbrush, it is generously endowed but at the same time elegant and silky smooth. A quintessential example of pure finesse, elegance, harmony and delicacy is combined into a wine that lingers intensely with near-perfect poise and character. Haut-Bailly's ethereal character is virtually unmatched in Bordeaux.</i>		
<b>Château La Garde, Pessac-Léognan</b>	<b>2000</b>	<b>£35.99</b>
<b>Château Brown, Pessac-Léognan</b>	<b>2014</b>	<b>£35.99</b>
<i>Viticulture can be traced as far back as the reign of Henry II on Château Brown's 59ha estate in Pessac Leognan, south of the city of Bordeaux. Since 1795, the property has been known under the name of Brown, John Lewis - a Scots wine trader who also had a hand in establishing the greater known Château Cantenac-Brown in Margaux. Château Brown was bought in 2004 by the Mau family, together with a Dutch businessman, Cees Dirkzwager. Whilst Château Brown white wines are among the best of great whites from Bordeaux—the Reds have also been recognised as one of the top wines from the relatively new appellation Pessac-Léognan which was created in 1987 by André Lurton, the head of one of Bordeaux's most influential families.</i>		
<b>Château Talbot, Saint-Julien</b>	<b>2010</b>	<b>£115.00</b>
<i>because it takes its name from John Talbot, 1st Earl of Shrewsbury, who in 1453 suffered the ignominy of losing the Battle of Castillon (The Hundred Years War), and with it his life, which allowed Bordeaux and its vineyards to slip back into French control after belonging to the British Crown for over 340 years. This class growth owes its first-rate reputation to the particularly charming character of its wine. Unfailingly consistent, Talbot embodies with elegance all the complexity of its terroir. Its firm, well-rounded tannins offer a smoothness ever present over the years. Being highly concentrated, it can be left to age for many years even though it is tempting to drink it young to enjoy the fullness of its fruity aromas and silken finish.</i>		
<b>Château Branaire-Ducru, Saint-Julien</b>	<b>2011</b>	<b>£53.99</b>
<i>Situated on the opposite side of the road from Beychevelle in the south of the St-Julien appellation. Patrick Maroteaux has owned the property since 1988 &amp; has invested heavily in new plantings as well as installing a new cuvier and an ultra-modern chai. The proportion of Cabernet Sauvignon in the blend is one of the highest in the Médoc at 80/85%. "A top-notch effort from this estate, the 2011 exhibits an exotic perfume of lead pencil shavings, white chocolate, raspberry jam and red as well as blackcurrants. Loads of fruit, a medium to full-bodied mouthfeel and velvety tannin suggest this beauty will drink well for 15+ years. It is one of the stars of the appellation". - Robert Parker</i>		
<b>Château Langoa-Barton, Saint-Julien</b>	<b>2008</b>	<b>£62.99</b>
<i>In 1826, Hugh Barton, already proprietor of Château Langoa, purchased part of the big Léoville estate next door. This became known as Léoville Barton. Six generations of Bartons have since followed, and continued to improve the quality of the wine, classified a 2nd growth in 1855. Ronald Barton inherited the property in 1927. He in turn donated it to his nephew Anthony in 1983. Today the vineyards are jointly owned by Anthony Barton, his daughter Lilian Barton-Sartorius and her children Melanie and Damien, thus making eight generations of Barton family at Léoville Barton.</i>		

<b>6.</b>	<b>Vintage</b>	<b>Bottle Price</b>
<b>ECHO de Lynch-Bages, Château Lynch-Bages</b>	<b>2016</b>	<b>£49.49</b>
<p>Château Lynch Bages, a 5ème Cru Classé, is one of the best-known Médoc estates and has always had a particularly strong following on this side of the English Channel. Since 1973 it has been owned by the enigmatic Jean-Michel Cazes and is now run by his son, Jean-Charles. Lynch Bages's vineyards are superbly sited on a plateau west of Pauillac town, in the small village of Bages. The 90ha of vineyards lie on deep gravel beds over limestone. Fermentation is temperature-controlled with extensive 'remontage' to ensure concentration and depth of colour. This is their 2nd wine, which many tasters think is good enough to be a 1st. Generous dark fruits; cedar spice, tobacco leaf and black pepper dominate the complex palate: full-bodied, with velvety tannins and a long finish.</p>		
<b>Château Le Crock, Cru Bourgeois St-Estèphe</b>	<b>2003</b>	<b>£31.49</b>
<p>Château Le Crock is one of the finest Cru Bourgeois properties in St. Estèphe, and has been owned by the Cuvelier family since 1903. They also own Léoville Poyferré, as well as a successful négociant business. Le Crock is located south of the village of St. Estèphe, with its 33ha of vines being adjacent to those of Montrose and Cos d'Estournel. Robert Parker - "This is the finest effort I have yet seen from this beautiful chateau, situated on a sweeping hillside with a river, swans, and a Walt Disney-like structure. Le Crock is owned by the Cuvelier family, which has done a great job at Leoville-Poyferre. The 2003 has benefited from being a St.-Estephe, the most consistent appellation of the vintage. Its dense ruby/purple colour is followed by gorgeous aromas of black currants, blackberries, licorice, smoke, and earth. A heady, alcoholic personality, fleshy mouthfeel, medium to full body, and low acidity make for a hedonistic, satisfying, long, concentrated claret."</p>

It is located in the south of the appellation on the border with Pauillac and its vineyards are superbly sited on a south-facing gravel ridge with a high clay content, just north of Lafite. "The medium to deep garnet colored 2008 Cos d'Estournel is blended of 85% Cabernet Sauvignon, 13% Merlot and 2% Cabernet Franc. Pow! The nose explodes with notes of baked cherries, preserved plums, fried herbs, beef drippings and warm cassis with wafts of wood smoke, salami and tobacco leaf. Medium-bodied, the palate is elegant and earthy/savory in character, sporting beautifully ripe, grainy tannins and bags of freshness, finishing on a lingering mineral note." Robertparker.com</p>		
<b>Château Ormes De Pez Jean-Michel Cazes, St-Estèphe</b>	<b>2012</b>	<b>£33.29</b>
<p>Château Les Ormes de Pez bis one of St-Estèphe's leading Cru Bourgeois properties. It was bought by Jean-Charles Cazes in 1936 and is now owned and run by Jean-Michel Cazes. The latter owns Lynch-Bages! The estate is located just outside the village of Pez in the northern part of the commune. There are 32 hectares of vineyards, which lie on soils rich in gravel on a subsoil of sand and clay. They are planted with 60% Cabernet Sauvignon, 30% Merlot and 10% Cabernet Franc. The grapes are hand-harvested and then fermented in temperature-controlled, stainless steel vats. The wine is then matured in a combination of one and two-year-old barrels from Lynch-Bages. The 2012 Les Ormes de Pez is flashy and seductive. Scents of sweet tobacco, mint, crushed flower, savoury herbs, game, anise and leather meld into a core of dark-fleshed fruit. Some earthiness is already showing in this compact and classic wine, with bright red fruits and deeper cassis showing in tandem. The tannins offer a gentle structure, framing the wine through to a chalky finish.</p>

<p>This excellent little property in the obscure Côtes de Francs is producing delicious wines. Now owned by the president of Bordeaux negociant Dourthe, Jean-Marie Chadronnier, Chateau Marsau has been heralded by Robert Parker as "The Petrus of the Côtes de Francs". Lying at the top of a hill, north-east of the village of Francs, the vineyards benefit from an excellent microclimate, with exceptional sunshine hours. The soils are predominantly clay which suits the Merlot grape variety, with which 85% of the vineyards are planted, very well. The character of the wines is classic right-bank with soft, round, elegant fruit and fabulous balance with the pure ripe tannins in this wine providing a lovely backbone to the ripe blackcurrant and cherry fruit. This region could be one of the next big things in Bordeaux.</p>

It is this parcel that makes the special Cuvée Jean Baptiste. Elegant yet plump and corpulent, this opaque ruby/purple wine is fleshy, succulent, hedonistic and satisfying on all levels – the pleasure senses as well as intellectual ones!</p>
